April Garden Tips

- * The best thing about April is that it's TIME TO PLANT! One of the benefits of this past winter's warmer temperatures is that we can install plant material earlier in the season. The ground never really froze this year. So, we've already begun installing shrubbery and small trees. Landscaping plants and annuals will follow later this month and into May. * According to the University of Maryland's Extension Office, April 25 through May 5th is the best two weeks in the year to plant vegetables and herbs on the Eastern Shore. If we get a cold snap around that time, then delay planting for a week or so.
- * Do you need mulch this spring? You might not. If your landscape beds already have a sizable layer on them, don't add more. Do what the professionals do and break up the hard crust that has

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formed over the winter months. This allows water to penetrate the mulch and get to the roots of the plant material. We call it "fluffing" the mulch. It takes some time, but you also have an extra added benefit. Your gardens will appear as if they have been freshly mulched...and it won't cost you a cent. Just make sure you have about a two inch layer of mulch as a base.

Driveway Weeds Driving You Crazy?

No matter how perfect your landscaping is, weeds along your driveway can make it appear disheveled. They make your property look tired and messy. Here's a money-saving tip for stone or gravel driveways. You probably spray your driveway with Round-Up or you may have a professional come in and do the job for you. Landscapers like myself use a contractor's grade product that is similar to Round-Up, only much more effective. Our product usually lasts longer too, but it certainly doesn't last throughout the entire growing season. Before you spray, I suggest that you treat the entire stone driveway with a granular pre-emergent herbicide. It has the extra added benefit of preventing weed seeds from germinating. That's where the savings part occurs. You won't have to use a Round-Up or "postemergent" type product as often this year. Post emergents only kill weeds that you can see while pre-emergents prevent future weed growth.

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Tick Activity Noted Earlier Than Normal Mild Winter Cited As Cause

Ticks in the mid-Atlantic region of the country were active much later in the year this past winter. They are also likely to be much more prevalent in 2012 due to lack of freezing temperatures.

Rainy weather also brings about increased tick activity. Our area, particularly the Eastern Shore, has seen a moderate wet winter; ideal for harboring ticks.
