


Here's a photo of one of the front gardens at my house.

June Garden Tips

* This is a good month to finish planting your garden. Make sure you have a tomato plant or two tucked away somewhere. We planted several different varieties of Heirloom tomatoes this year.




Here's a picture of Melissa and our niece from New York City.

- * As you might be able to tell from this photograph, we like to plant marigolds in our vegetable garden. They're a natural insect deterrent. The jury is still out on this one, but we like the flowers around the borders of a vegetable garden.
- * Move house plants to shaded areas outside for the summer. Most house plants need more water during hot and windy weather, so keep a water source handy for outdoor care.
- * As your garden thrives, so do your weeds. Try to keep on top of them; otherwise your landscaping starts to look shabby very quickly. Deadheading your flowers also helps keep your gardens in order.



* I was pleasantly surprised when my Dianthus bloomed again last month. I always forget about this hardy little flower. I did some research to refresh my knowledge about dianthus. It grows best in full sun. The edges are "frilled." Apparently, this is a fancy word meaning the edges are star shaped. Dianthus features pretty pink blossoms. Our Tick Repellent Program

This is a picture of a deer tick that is magnified many times.

The actual tick is about the size a pinhead.

Difficult to see and even more difficult to extract, if you're bitten.

I developed our tick repellent program after Dad's illness and my own health scares from a tick bite. After extensive research, I now offer a perimeter spray for ticks that is guaranteed to be effective. We'll return to your property and respray selected areas, if you find another tick.

We've also added an additional layer of protection to the program. Damminix tubes are one of my favorite parts of this service.

They're cardboard tubes, much like the roll from paper towels. They contain cotton balls which have been soaked in permethrin. It's deadly to ticks, but not for mice, squirrels and birds who take the cotton back to their nests.

Permethrin rubs off on the fur of the mouse or squirrel. Ticks are killed in their nests and can't be transferred back to you.
