Garden Tips

- June is a busy month in the garden. It's time to prune and shape spring flowering trees and shrubbery.
 Remember how beautiful the forsythia and azaleas were this year? Keep them healthy by paring off the old branches to make way for new growth next spring.
- Deadheading your flowers is the best way to keep your bedding plants blooming. This is especially effective when dealing with hydrangea, day lilies and roses.
- We got a tip that this year's strawberry crop is one of the best ever. By the time you receive this newsletter, it should be peak season for local strawberries and blueberries will follow soon.
- When you purchase container or bedding plants from a garden center, be sure to gently break away some of the roots when transplanting. If you place a mass of circular roots into the ground, they will continue to grow that way.

Elatior Begonias

For years, Elatior begonias have been enormously popular in Europe. We just discovered them this past spring. Elatiors are a hybrid begonia which were introduced to this country only a few years ago.

These plants are incredible to behold. They produce beautiful blooms just like a tiny rosebud in many vivid colors. And the foliage is a deep green that highlights the intense colors of the blooms.

Elatiors have been cross-bred with a tuberous begonia and "*Begonia socotrana*" from the small island of Socotra, off the Horn of Africa. This island gets extremely hot during their summer. The flowers grow dormant in the heat, but flourish during cooler weather. We already have several plants that are growing well in a shady spot on our deck.

Ajuga - Deer Resistant and Terrific

We found Ajuga while browsing the wonderful plant material at Garden Treasures. They carry 3 or 4 different varieties of it. Ajuga is a stunning ground cover that forms small white, pink or purplish-blue rosette flowers among the foliage. It's a creeping ground cover, so it will provide a thick carpet, if given enough time. Ajuga tolerates a wide range of soil conditions provided the soil is well drained. It can be grown in full sun or full shade. The leaves may be smaller if grown in full sun, but it produces more rosette flowers in the sun. Ajuga likes moist, well-drained soil.

Best of all, Ajuga is known to be a deer resistant plant. So, it can be used over a large area without fear of it disappearing to feed hungry deer.

One more fact: Ajuga is one of the few plants that a pre-emergent herbicide will harm, if not fully established.

Weeding Woes?????.....
